

"Amy's employer was the U.S. Government, Civil Service, GS 12. Her Department was Pacific Command, Joint Intelligence Operations Center. She as a J2X Staff Officer. When I asked her co-worker what Amy's duties were she replied "Amy made everything work from budget to fine details of conferences. I think Amy was born with this mind set. At about 6 she would organize our pantry. All the beans, canned tomatoes, common denominator foods together, expired foods thrown out. Amy, Eric and I took skiing vacations during their elementary school years. At about 8, I'd let Amy know it was time to pack. She would say, I'm ready. And she was. Right down to googles. She absolutely amazed me with her "executive skills" at an early age.

I guess all I can update at this time is that Ed and I are forced to use our executive skills. We are taking care of all those things that go with last details of someone's life.

We wonder if she's laughing at us, looking for certain info that she could put her finger on. Or is she sensing how missed she is by Ed and me, her doggies and everyone else who knew her. Even the two visiting kind Jehovah Witnesses are crying over Amy. She took the time to listen to their message though contrary to her own beliefs.

Amy looked back with no regrets. She told me she was most proud of her military service. She said she had been to all the places in the world that she wanted to see. She said she took every walk with Abby, letting chores slide. She adored Ed and nurtured him and wanted him to be happy. She appreciated who Ed is and forgave or understood their minor differences.
